Historical Highlight

The W.O. Burgess Tapes... "River Log Driver"

Eighteen years ago, before his grandfather W.O. Burgess passed away, Bill Newell, owner of Mountain Spring Lodge interviewed him about his life and experiences growing up in the Plain Valley in the early 1900's. W.O. Burgess was the son of W.W. Burgess, who came to the Plain Valley in 1892 and was one of the original pioneers of the area.

Here is one of the stories that W.O. Burgess shared with his grandson:

Bill: When did they start running logs down the Wenatchee River to Leavenworth?

W.O.: Oh, that was a long time ago, from 1910 on. I worked as a river log driver from 1924 until they quit running the logs around 1929.

Bill: Tell me how you got your experience in log driving.

W.O.: My brother Jack and I used to go down to the river when we were playing. It was full of log jams all the time ...

I remember when they shot the rocks out of the river. The river had a lot more big rocks in it back then. They shot those big boulders so they wouldn't hang the logs up. I remember when they did that and I was way too small to work. Jack and I would go up on the log jams and pry them loose just for the fun of it. We'd get stranded once in awhile and have to jump on one of the logs and ride it out. We'd ride

Ant Interdiction and Suppression

A well organized army, usually working under the cover of darkness, is covertly infiltrating your palace. The ants are hard at work again.

Invading your house has become their annual spring ritual. Fight back with Triazicide granular barrier treatment. This product replaces Dursban and Diazinon, the manufacture of which has been discontinued due to environmental concerns. Ten pound bags are now in stock. They sell for \$13.99.

Trap 'em before they trap you inside

While bees are healthy for your yard in terms of helping to pollinate your garden and fruit trees in the spring, by late in the summer the yellow jackets can become quite pesky. Our yellow jacket traps with attractant work very well at reducing the yellow jacket population. You can reuse them each year, by buying the attractant capsules. The traps sell for \$9.49.

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How Do I Attract a Wide Variety of Wild Birds To My Backyard?



The birds you attract to your yard is determined primarily by the seeds you offer, but also by the type of feeder. Black oil sunflower is the favorite of all birds that visit tube and house type of feeders. Millet is favored by birds who visit platform type of feeders. The most effective way to attract the largest variety of birds to your backyard is to put out separate feeders for each type of food:

- suet feeder
- house feeder for black oil sunflower seed
- hummingbird feeder
- platform feeder for millet
- tube feeder for thistle and black oil sunflower seed

I have a confession to make; I am a recovering tee shirt junkie.

In my prior business life, I had the good fortune to work in a company and with clients who believed that a tee shirt should be produced to celebrate any milestone – a 10 year anniversary, a contract signing, surviving until any given Friday. You name it, if it happened, I got a tee shirt for it!

This easy access to tees only fed my growing habit. To further my problems, I was a founding member of the “Been There, Done That, Got the Tee” club. So in addition to my business-related tees, I picked up shirts from blues festivals, sushi bars, music concerts, hotels, sporting events – well, you get the idea. I was in trouble.

This addiction got so bad that a few years ago, I awoke with a start one night and found myself standing in the middle of the bedroom, with my heart racing and adrenaline screaming in my ears listening to the sound of what I thought to be a homicidal maniac violently breaking

into the house. I investigated every door and window but found no sign of forced entry. I finally returned to bed confused and wary. The next morning upon entering the closet to dress, I was greeted by a four foot pile of clothing, mainly tee shirts running the length of the room. My tee shirt shelf had collapsed under its own weight and brought two other shelves with it. At this point, I could no longer deny that I had a serious problem. I decided to plan my own treatment protocol.

I staged a personal intervention and forced myself to divest most of my prized tee collection. The usable ones went to Goodwill and the really ratty ones went into the garbage. I still awake with cold sweats some nights imagining a homeless guy wearing a cheesy “Ross For Boss ‘92” tee shirt. I can’t help it, I just feel responsible for letting something like that get out on the streets!

Ultimately, I was left with a few of the highest quality tees (and all of my “Life Is Good” shirts, regardless of their condition — I said I was recovering, not healed!) Since that low point in my tee collecting, my recovery has been painfully slow but generally steady.

If I do collect, I go for high quality, 100% soft cotton, and smart looking shirts. In order to earn a place in my collection the tees must be both “cool” and comfortable! Given my past, I’m nothing if not an expert on cool and comfortable.

Burn Ban Info

Outdoor burning of yard waste is banned between June 1st and September 31st in Chelan County. It is okay to have a campfire/cooking fire within a fire ring unless the conditions are extremely dry. Call 509-763-3034 after June 1st to verify that there is not a burn ban on campfire/cooking fires as well.

It is always illegal to burn the following items in an outdoor fire: garbage, paper cardboard, treated wood, plastic, metals, paint, tires, pesticide containers, dead animals, demolition debris, petroleum products and asphalt. And remember, burn barrels are illegal in the State of Washington. For more information call 509-456-2926.

the log down the river until we got to shallow water and there was a chance to jump off. Of course if the folks had known anything about it, they'd have put us in straitjackets and taken us home!

Bill: You couldn't swim?

W.O.: No, I never did learn to swim.

Bill: What was a typical day in the life of a river log driver?

W.O.: You could call us river rats ... We had to get to work by 7, long before daylight. No matter how much ice you had to break or how much snow you had to wade, you had to get to the river. You had to get in clear up to your waist. If you didn't you got cold feet, and wouldn't want to get in at all. It was required that you get wet, first thing. Of course, most of the time I was in the water all the time and never did get out until noon. That's what we did. We stayed in the water until noon. Then we'd have lunch and afterward we went in the water again until about 3:30. Most of the time there were two or three big fires built where you'd go to get your clothes dried out after work.


